

High School Course Selection Handbook

Graduation Requirements

In order to meet graduation requirements for a BC High School Certificate of Graduation (Dogwood), students must:

- earn a minimum of 80 credits in Grades 10-12
 - 52 credits are mandatory courses
 - o a minimum of 28 elective credits are required
 - 16 credits of the 80 credits must be at the Grade 12 level
- complete the Grade 10 Literacy Provincial Assessment, Grade 10 Numeracy Provincial Assessment, and Grade 12 Literacy Provincial Assessment.

Students are reminded to research program requirements carefully to ensure that they are taking the necessary courses to be accepted into their post-secondary program of choice or trades apprenticeship. Although second languages (French or Spanish) are not mandatory to graduate from high school, some post-secondary programs require Grade 11 credits in a second language. Colleges and technical schools also have specific admission requirements that may impact course selections in Grade 11 and Grade 12.

Mandatory Courses:

Grade 11	English 11, Social Studies (either 11 or 12), Science (either 11 or 12), Math (either 11 or 12)
and Grade 12	English First Peoples Studies 12, Career Life Connections 12, at least two other Grade 12 electives

KCS also requires all students to complete the following courses: Bible Studies 9, Bible Studies 10, Bible Studies 11, Bible Studies 12

Elective Courses:

Elective courses are usually offered on alternate years (see schedule below). Thursdays are "flex days" with some elective courses being offered only on Thursdays all year (2 credit or 4 credit courses).

Courses without links in the following table are locally developed KCS courses (Board/Authority Authorized: BAA courses). Descriptions for these courses are included below the schedule.

Note that courses are offered based on student enrollment and teacher availability, therefore, some courses listed may not run in the year scheduled, while other courses may be offered on a yearly basis.

Additional Course Descriptions

Local Service and Leadership 10

Local Service and Leadership is a service learning course intended to help students grow in Christian character and identity. Students will be asked to develop and implement plans to help meet others' needs within our school and local community. Just as faith without works is dead (James 2:14-17), empathy and compassion are meaningless without action. Through the process of acting as justice seekers and servant workers, students will regularly reflect on their experiences and what it truly means to be image bearers of God.

This course is an elective.

Horticulture 11

This course introduces students to the science and art of growing plants, with a focus on sustainable gardening practices and real-world applications. Students will explore topics such as plant biology, soil science, plant propagation, garden planning, and pest management. Through hands-on activities and outdoor learning, students will gain practical experience in growing vegetables, flowers, herbs, and ornamental plants. The course also highlights environmental responsibility, the benefits of local food production, and potential careers in horticulture. No previous experience is required—just a willingness to get your hands dirty and learn by doing! *This course is an elective.*

Tabletop Game Design 9/10

Students will explore the basics of tabletop game design, including some history and delving into the basic principles and game types. You'll examine what makes a game enjoyable and frustrating, what kinds of goals there can be, and the importance of aesthetics (art, layout, game pieces). You'll plan and create your own game that has clear rules, player interactions, enjoyable mechanics, and practice balancing complexity with player satisfaction.

You'll create a prototype, refine that with game play tests and feedback, and explore some applications for production and funding when it comes to potentially marketing a tabletop game. *This course is an elective.*

Studio Arts 3D 11 (with focus on Stagecraft)

Step into the creative world of stagecraft in this hands-on course! From set design and construction to crafting props and artistic elements, you'll develop the skills that transform ideas into tangible creations. Learn techniques in building, painting, and sculpting as you bring stories to life through the power of visual art. Whether you're a skilled artist or just love working with your hands, Stagecraft 11 offers a chance to create, collaborate, and contribute to unforgettable productions.

This course is an elective.

Explorations in Social Studies 11 (with focus on History through Film)

Discover history's stories through the lens of film in this engaging course. Explore pivotal moments in world history, social justice movements, and Indigenous history in Canada while reflecting on themes of human dignity, care, and stewardship. Through analysis and discussion, you'll develop critical thinking, media literacy, and historical inquiry skills, learning to evaluate perspectives, uncover bias, and connect past events to present challenges. History Through Film invites you to see history in new ways, grounded in a Christ-like vision of justice, compassion, and reconciliation.

This course is an elective.

Mythbusters 11

Mythbusters is an inquiry based course where you will ask and try to answer your own science related questions while exploring God's creation. In this course, you will work with a partner or small group to design and complete your own experiments while following the scientific method. During this course you will also be strengthening your leadership, teamwork, and communication skills as you work together to complete projects and share your discoveries with others.

This course is an elective.
